Taking notes from a book, you should record:		
Author(s) or Editor(s)

Year of publication

Taking notes from an edited book (a collection of chapters by different authors)		
In addition to noting all of the above information, you will also need to make a note of the		
following details.		
Chapter author(s)		
Title of the chapter		
Page reference (use p. if a single page and pp. if the chapter is more than one page)
