What is Cyberbullying?



"Cyberbullying is when someone repeatedly harasses, mistreats, or makes fun of another person online or while using cell phones or other electronic devices."

Cyberbullying Venues

- Emails
- Instant messaging
- Text or digital imaging messages sent on cell phones
- Web pages
- Blogs
- Chat rooms or discussion groups
- Other information communication technologies

Student Attitudes Online



- Increase in online courses
- Forum-based discussions
- Monitoring by professor
- Message boards

Hostility toward Professors

- Resent slow grading
- Lack of presence on forums
- Emails
 - To professor
 - To other students
 - To administration
- Anonymous posts to discussion boards



Online Etiquette

- Clarify expectations
 - Bad language
 - insults
- Discussion focus
- Posting
 - Too casual
 - Too personal
 - Mean



Set Preferences

- Filter
 - Bad language
 - Racial slurs
- Anonymous posts



Online Presence



- Check forums regularly
- Participate
- Be involved
- Stop conversations
- Eliminate concerns
- Reporting process

Communicate

- Students who stop participating
 - Why?
 - Address concerns
- Students who show hostile behaviors
 - Email then phone
 - Warn
 - Discipline



Educate

- Include a plan in your syllabus
 - Expected behaviors
 - Unacceptable behaviors
 - Consequences for specific behaviors
- Swift attention
 - Contact
 - Reduction of grades
 - Referral for formal disciplinary action
