

What is a journal?

An academic journal is a regular publication (scholarly magazine) that contains articles relating to a specific area of study.

The articles are written by experts in the field, and often go through a process called 'peer review' which means that you can be sure that journals contain good quality academic information.

Academic journals are an essential source of information as they provide accurate, reliable and up to date research.

This short guide shows you how to find journals for your course and subject.

Finding journals for your module

To view the recommended journals for your course, go to the [Library Catalogue](#) web page

Click on the drop down menu on the left-hand side of the page and select 'Module Code' from the list. ('Keyword' is the default)

Type your module code with no spaces into the search box.

Click on the drop down menu on the right-hand side of the page and select 'all Journals'.

(The default choice is 'View Entire Collection')

Click on 'Submit' or press enter.

The results will be the recommended journals for your course.

Finding journals for your subject

To search the [Library Catalogue](#) for all journals relating to eg **Dance**.

Use 'Dance' as your Keyword.

Select 'All journals' from the drop-down menu to the right of the search box.

You will see that there are journals covering different aspects of Dance.

To put your results into alphabetical order, according to title, simply click on the 'title' link just to the right of the search box.

Finding printed journals

Information about print journal holdings and the location in which they are held can be found in the [Library Catalogue](#).

If you want to see whether we subscribe to a particular journal go to the library catalogue web page

Click on the drop down menu on the left-hand side of the page and select 'Title' from the list. ('Keyword' is the default)

Type the title of the journal into the search box.

Click on the drop down menu on the right-hand side of the search box and select 'all Journals'. (The default choice is 'View Entire Collection')

Click on 'Submit' or press enter.

Most journals are housed on the first floor of the University Library, however, some Law journals may be located on the second floor with the law collection.

Some of our older journals may be kept in the University Library journals store.

Inter Library Loans

If you need an item which is not in stock in any of our libraries, and is not available via our electronic resources, you may request an Inter Library Loan.

The Inter Library Loan service allows you to access materials that we do not currently hold.

We will do our best to obtain it for you through either the national or international inter-library loan network.

If you are a member of staff, researcher, postgraduate, or undergraduate, you are eligible to use the Inter Library Loans Service.

You can ask for almost any sort of printed materials:

Books

Journal articles

Conference proceedings

Theses

Reports

Book chapters

Whole issues of journals etc.
