In the course you have to do a set list of modules you have so...three, so last semester we did anatomy, we did sports therapy and critical inquiry and in them you after have to sit...some, practical exams and some written exams.

I got tested for dyslexia and it came back, that I had dyslexia but not just that I had also something called "Irlens"...where it's a case of, reading black print on a white paper and I read it...the words all move around the page.

So, for that I got tested with different coloured overlays and papers. It turns out that the color that I needed the most was the blue, which I find helps with my specific learning difficulty.

When I started...err university we had to obviously, as I said before, we had to sit exams and stuff and one of the module lecture's Kristian came up with an idea of using PowerPoint to...like release that... unnervousness and uneasiness. I found it is much easier than havin' someone next to you.

So...we have a thing called blackboard and in it you put all your seminar material and lecture material and when you go home you can open that same document and there's a button in like, the top right hand corner of PowerPoint and you click it, it will tell yeah what's on that page.

So...if it's a lower limb it will tell you what muscle it says on that page and it will tell you the origin, the insertion of that muscle. So, with it being in the right-hand corner of the seminar, it's also the right-hand corner of the exam PowerPoint. So, it's very familiar and natural just to click that button.

Having someone who teaches you to read out the questions on a PowerPoint is a good thing, because it's like, they know the terminology, they know how to say it. So, if you've got someone who doesn't know the terminology you could get anything, you could get...words that are made up.

But, if with someone speaking to you, especially someone that you know and they know how to say it then it allows you to like...form a sentence kind of thing you're writing.
