

## Participatory Action Research *is* a Political Activity!

- 1903 Emmeline
   Pankhurst and daughters founded the Women's Social and Political Union from their parlour
- 1987 The Pankhurst Centre opened as an educational, women-only space

#### Marx and Engels met in Manchester



- 1845 Condition of Working Class in England (Engels)
- 1848 Communist Manifesto (Marx & Engels)
- Engels' statue outside Home where Mike Leigh's film Peterloo was premiered
- Manchester bee symbol of solidarity and community

#### I listened to Freire on Manchester streets



- 1980s community worker in Manchester
- Freire's critical praxis influenced PAR and CD
- Principles and values frame theory and practice
- Freire Institutes worldwide

#### Abasindi Black Women's Co0perative



- 1980 Paula, founder member of Abasindi
- Whiteness as unearned, invisible privilege in the world
- White privilege one of the biggest lessons needed in today's political context

### Local practice taken out of its political context:

- Scratches at surface symptoms of injustice
- Risks laying responsibility at feet of victims
- Fails to reach under the surface deep enough to find root sources of structural power
